At our Dream Event, we learned that we are a parish that dreams of being welcoming, loving, and is full of hope.


Some of the main relationships we hope to enliven are those with spouses, God, and family.

Haiti: Education is the door to the future

Thank you for your continued support of the Haiti Solidarity Partnership Ministry. Our recent fundraiser 'A Night in Haiti' was well attended and we netted \$29,376.00 for our sister parish, St. Benoît.

These funds will keep the church and school open for approximately 6 months. This event and Monsignor Wildor's appeal in the fall are the only sources of income for St. Benoît. We continue to work with them on sustainable projects such as animal husbandry, microfinance and higher education for the graduating students.

The theme of 'Education, the Door to the Future' can be best shared by the first success story from St. Benoît.

Jean-Bernard Orival, eldest son of Sauveur and Destinette Orival, graduated with his master's degree from the University of Quebec at Montreal in 2018. He was raised with his younger brother, Patrick, in Dessources and could not believe the transformation of the village upon a recent visit home. He stated that growing up in Dessources they had no water source close by, church or school. He is most thankful to Mary, Queen of Peace for your support in creating this opportunity for the parishioners of St. Benoît.

A brief background: St. Benoît was designated a parish in 2009 when newly ordained Father Wildor Pierre was assigned to this remote parish. Then the earthquake struck in January 2010 and the people from the affected areas rushed to the remote areas to find safety.

Archbishop Gregory Aymond suggested that New Orleans area parishes seek a partnership, and former MQP pastor Fr. Ronnie Calkins spearheaded the effort here. With the help of Catholic Relief Services in New Orleans, we set our sights on working with Father Wildor.

It has been nothing but miraculous what has happened on this mountaintop with the support of Mary, Queen of Peace. Father Wildor became Monsignor Wildor in just a few short years as a priest. Bishop Dumas of Haiti counts on him as his right hand man.

During our first visit in 2012, there was a small church with a partial roof. The 50 elementary students were studying in different sections of the church. When it rained, classes were cancelled. To let people know this, the church bells

were silent. There was no call to class. The students walked up to one hour to attend classes. They always carried a gallon of water to school for the rectory and school.

Fast forward seven years and there are now 500 students from Pre-K to high school and a staff of 32 qualified teachers.



Jean-Bernard did not have this advantage. He and his brother attended schools in Port-au-Prince and stayed with family members.

His father, Sauveur Orival, lead the communion services for the community for many years in the chapel of St. Benoît before it was designated a church and Father Wildor arrived. His mother, Destinete, would walk up to 2 hours one way to work in an orphanage. She would head out on a Monday and return on Friday.

They still do not have running water or electricity in their home. This did not stop them from working hard to ensure their sons would have a formal education.

It was during Jean-Bernard's first visit to Mary, Queen of Peace in 2012 that he met with the Haiti Solidarity Partnership Ministry and was introduced to Karen and Tom Sheehy. They were excited to see his joy and hope with an opportunity to attend graduate studies in Quebec. However, he had no means for his dream to come true, but somehow trusted in God to provide. The Sheehys opened their hearts and offered to pay for his graduate studies. What a gift! Sauveur and Destinete's prayers had been answered through their son lean-Bernard.

Jean-Bernard worked hard in his studies and was able to receive a partial scholarship for his studies in his first year. The Sheehys had committed to the funding therefore, three other students were able to attend a university with the savings from Jean Bernard's scholarship. One is in medical school in the Dominican Republic, the second is in school in Haiti studying agronomy, and the third is studying business in Port-au-Prince.

Jean-Bernard graduated in 2018 with a master's degree in computer science from the TRIME lab, a wireless telecommunications lab, in Montreal. He was married to his Haitian sweetheart, Dalida, in February 2019. They now live in Miami

and look forward to hosting his parents to live with them.

The progress continues with an initial grant from the Sheehy's non-for-profit The Healing Eyes of Mercy. They have earmarked funds for university studies in Haiti for graduates of St. Benoît. There are currently 12 students enrolled in various universities in Haiti.

As Karen states: "God creates all people with human dignity and one important aspect of this innate dignity is the ability to work and provide for their and their family's basic needs."

As other funds become available we will be able to

send more worthy students on for higher education to reach that door to success.

This program is funded by private donations only specific to this goal and is not funded by the existing ministry funds.


The Catholic Daughters of the Americas at MQP have been busy with outreach and service projects. This spring, they collected and donated Easter gift bags for Free Indeed.

For the past four years, he has run a caregiver

support group for the Council on Aging in St. Tammany, and his experiences led him to write "The Peace with Dementia Rosary."

"Over the years, I've had people talking about going to church (for support) and that got me thinking about spirituality and religion, specifically the rosary, to be relied upon for strength and guidance."



Matt sees the fruits of his mother's sacrifices. "Going through something difficult can bring good. If she hadn't gone through it, I wouldn't have been able to help people through this."
