Brothers and Sisters in Christ,



RESTORING OUR CHURCH

After many decades, weather and other elements take a toll on our church buildings. The "Our Faith in the Future" capital campaign was an opportunity for many of our churches to make repairs and improvements.

A Very Big Year Saint Kateri, Bay Mills St. Francis Xavier, Brimley

These two congregations, located in the northeast corner of the Diocese of Marquette, are linked and share a single pastor, Rev. Augustine Jacob. When Father Augustine began his new assignment here in 2012, he may not have anticipated the big year that lay ahead for both parishes!

As if the October canonization of its namesake, Saint Kateri Tekakwitha, and the subsequent re-naming of the mission from "Blessed" to "Saint" wasn't enough, St. Kateri and St. Francis Xavier, which jointly celebrated the Easter Vigil on March 20, saw a total of 29 welcomed into the Church– probably a record number in one year for this small community. Twenty-four received Baptism and fice were welcomed to full communion with the Church. Additionally, St. Francis Xavier





the flooring in the parish hall was redone. "The special flooring material used, Threadflex, is non-slip and is really good stuff," said parish secretary, Karen Serfass. At St. Francis Xavier, the exterior of the church has been painted. Both churches will be updating their audio/visual systems. Dianne Compo, who serves on the St. Kateri Pastoral Council, commented that while both parishes struggle with low weekly offertory collections, both did quite well with fundraising for the diocesan-wide capital campaign, and parishioners and friends have been very generous with donations above and beyond the capital campaign for special parish projects.

"I hope that people will continue to faithfully fulfill their campaign pledges, as a sign of their love for and stewardship of these wonderful churches that were built by and handed down to us by previous generations," said Father Augustine.

Three Parishes Launch Delayed Campaigns

St. Anthony, Gwinn St. Joseph, Northland St. Joseph & St. Patrick, Escanaba

When the "Our Faith in the Future" campaign was conducted in 2010, several parishes were granted "delayed" campaigns due to special circumstances at the time.

Three of those parishes launched their delayed "Our Faith in the Future" campaign during this past year.

St. Anthony, Gwinn and its mission, St. Joseph, Northland, conducted their campaign last fall. St. Anthony raised over \$161,000 in pledges to boost their "Rainy Day Fund" and purchase a new organ. St. Joseph raised more than \$83,000 in pledges toward replacement of their church furnace or other emergency needs.

In Escanaba, St. Joseph & St. Patrick parish is currently conducting their delayed piggyback campaign this spring.

INTERIOR RESTORATION ADDS BEAUTY & HONORS HERITAGE

The sanctuary floor was replaced with glistening porcelain tile. The walls were reinforced with fiber glass sheeting and repainted. Beautiful stenciling on the ceiling and sanctuary walls depicts holy images that add depth and meaning to the celebration of the Mass. New lighting fixtures brighten the environment. "They (Affiliated Artists of Milwaukee) did a phenomenal job!" Brad said.

Statues of St. Michael the Archangel (which came from St. Michael Church in Perronville) and St. Therese the Little Flower (which came from Sacred Heart Church in Schaffer), which were deteriorating and broken, were repaired and repainted and now stand proudly honoring the heritage of those parishes which merged with St. George Parish in Bark River in 1995 to form the new parish of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton. The statues represent three parish communities that have come together under one roof.

CAMPAIGN MAKES SCHOOL **IMPROVEMENTS POSSIBLE**

Parishes that subsidize a Catholic school were asked to share their parish portion of campaign proceeds 50/50 with the local school. The nine Catholic schools in the diocese are using campaign proceeds to make a variety of physical plant improvements, technology upgrades, and curriculum enhancements.

A display board in the entrance of Father Marquette Elementary School proudly boasts, "Watch for New and Exciting Improvements Over the Summer!" and "Provided by Capital Campaign Funds!" Plans call for all new windows and a new flat roof.

The current windows are the originals from 1958 when the school was built. Fourth grader Ruth Hummell said, "When it's cold outside it lets the cold air in and when it's hot outside it gets really hot in the classroom."
