Retired Priests: Living by Faith

Following a back surgery at age 83, Rev. Msgr. Joe Scantlin retired in 2016. Monsignor Joe is a beloved priest in residence at Most Blessed Sacrament in Arlington and continues to pray and serve the parish as his body allows.

Through the course of a lifetime Catholic priests lay down their lives in service for the Church. Living by their faith, priests simply trust that God will provide for them in their later years. The Diocese of Fort Worth has 14 priests who continue to bless us in their retirement through prayer and five of them assist with sacramental ministry.

When a priest retires, they may continue living at a parish rectory but some need to live in nursing care or assisted living. Out-of-pocket medication copays have skyrocketed over the years, and the clergy, who live on a fixed income, are grateful when medication and other out-of-pocket expenses are reimbursed thanks to your gift to the Annual Diocesan Appeal.

Your generosity also supports long-term care for ailing priests who deserve peaceful end-of-life care. As more of our priests reach retirement age, our support will need to increase. Rural Parish Grant: Prison Ministry

To visit the imprisoned is one of seven Corporal Works of Mercy. Prison Ministry answers that call in seven state prison units throughout the 23 counties of the Diocese of Fort Worth. The communities of Blessed Virgin Mary in Decatur and St. Joseph in Bridgeport have been called to minister to Bridgeport Correctional Center. Raul Soto (pictured above, far right) and volunteers from the two parishes visit the unit weekly and provide Catholic books, bibles and catechisms. Providing for both the prisoners needs and meeting the parishes' operating budgets would not be possible without outside assistance. A grant from the Annual Diocesan Appeal allows the parishes to purchase books and retreat materials for their prison ministry.

As a medium security prison, many prisoners will end their sentences and re-enter our communities. With the support of the Annual Diocesan Appeal, these volunteers provide a solid Catholic foundation for these men and women that allows them to rejoin society as thriving and contributing citizens. While imprisoned they receive sacraments like baptism, reconciliation, Holy Communion and confirmation from Father Richard Collins, Prison Ministry Chaplain.

Through the Annual Diocesan Appeal, rural parish communities receive assistance in carrying out the Corporal Works of Mercy.

Gabriel Project: Serving Mothers Who Choose Life

The *Gabriel Project* is a parish-based ministry that has been supporting women experiencing a crisis pregnancies for almost 20 years in the Diocese of Fort Worth. In recent months there has been an increased need for services like the *Gabriel Project*. Last year with the support from the Annual Diocesan Appeal, the ministry joyfully welcomed 48 babies and served 175 moms through pregnancy and during the first year of their babies' lives. An outreach program of Catholic Charities Fort Worth, the Gabriel Project does not receive government grants. Volunteers, called Angels, and donations from individuals are the only resources available for this much needed ministry.

Kexsy Villeda Guerra, a dedicated and loving mother to two children, received assistance with her bills after delivery and was referred to Catholic Charities Career Development Services for employment counseling. Her Angel, Amy Beerwinkle, has been her biggest supporter and advocate; providing spiritual and emotional support. Kexsy currently works full time as an administrative assistant at a landscape company and also has a part time job during the weekends. To meet the increased demand for *Gabriel Project* services, the Annual Diocesan Appeal has pledged a substantial increase in grant funding this year.
