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## ST. JOHN

Saint John the Evangelist, brother to Saint James, traveled with Jesus from the onset of our Savior's public ministry. Inseparable from Jesus, the Gospels make clear that John, along with Peter and James was one of the most trusted of our Lord's disciples and was present with him at the wedding feast at Cana, during the Agony in the Garden and at the foot of the cross. John and Peter were the fi rst to receive

the news of the Resurrection from Mary Magdalene, and they hurried at once to the tomb, and there when Peter was restrained by awe, John "reached the tomb fi rst." Following Christ's return

to His heavenly Father, John's commitment to documenting the journey of this young community of faith, ensured a Church that has healed, taught and redeemed for more than two millennia.



### SAN PATRICIO

"The love of God grew in me more and more, as did the faith, so that, in a single day, I have said as many as a hundred prayers and in the night, nearly the same. I prayed in the woods and on the mountain, even before dawn. I felt no hurt from the snow or ice or rain."

### SAN PATRICIO

Born in Roman Britain, St. Patrick spent his youth as a slave after being captured by Irish pirates at the age of 14. Deeply steeped in pagan culture, St. Patrick returned to England when he was 20 and, after a vision in which he was asked to "walk among" and convert Ireland to the Christian faith, entered into study for the priesthood. For more than four decades, St. Patrick traveled by foot across the Irish countryside, often suffering great hardship, preaching the Gospel and converting thousands to Christianity. Heralded as the patron saint of Ireland and the patron of the Diocese of Fort Worth, St. Patrick is revered for his dedication in bringing a

nation into the loving embrace of Jesus Christ.



### ST. WILLIAM

Born into a wealthy Italian family, St. William, at an early age, undertook a pilgrimage to the tomb of St. James at the Santiago of Compostela. Inspired by his journey, St. William traveled to southern Italy and lived a life of quiet piety, establishing several monasteries for both men and women who were called to a life of prayerful devotion to our Blessed Lord, His commitment to this monastic lifestyle continued to his death and his relics now feature prominently in many cathedrals throughout Italy.

Born in Belgium, St. Alice was raised and educated in a Cistercian monastery, where, from a very early age, she demonstrated heroic devotion to the faith. In great suffering, St. Alice offered her pain for the salvation of sinners and for those in purgatory. Her life is celebrated as a model of monastic spirituality and she was canonized by Pope Pius X.
